#### PASTOR'S NOTES

Dear church family,

Recently I had the privilege of attending the national gathering of <a href="The Fellowship">The Fellowship</a> <a href="Community">Community</a>, a group of Christ-centered, biblically-rooted, mission-minded pastors and lay leaders within the Presbyterian Church USA. The event took place at First Presbyterian Church of Nashville, TN, and



its theme was "In But Not of the World: Engaging Culture & Thriving in Faith." Each speaker and activity focused on the ways we Christians might present a faithful witness to Jesus Christ amidst our rapidly changing and increasingly diverse society.

One of the keynote speakers was Andrew Root, who teaches at Luther Seminary in Minnesota. Andy has written six books (!) on the topic of ministry in a secular age – that is, an age in which belief in God is no longer assumed. His work has been profoundly helpful to me in my own walk with Christ and service to the church, so it was a joy to hear him speak in person. (Incidentally, Andy will be a presenter at the Montreat Wee Kirk conference this fall, so I will get even more time with him.) I have placed a copy of his book *When Church Stops Working* in our library, in case you would like to learn from him, as well.

Another keynote speaker was Dwight Radcliff, who teaches at Fuller Theological Seminary in California. Dwight spoke from his experience as an African American in a predominantly white church and academic context to help us think more deeply about our own cultural backgrounds. In his most powerful talk, he encouraged us to consider the ways those backgrounds might shape our beliefs and either close us off or open us up to others in Jesus' name. He received a lot of "amens" from the crowd, so Jack Hinson would be proud.

All of this makes it sound like I was just "nerding out" in Nashville (which I suppose I was, to some degree). But I was also so grateful for simple conversations with other pastors and leaders beside me – some of whom I knew, but most of whom I didn't. We ate meals and took walks together while discussing the blessings and challenges of ministry, and these times of solidarity and support were the highlight of my trip. It was yet another reminder of the importance of friendship for the Christian journey.

It's easy for us to feel discouraged and cynical in this cultural moment. We are so easily confused and divided and tempted to wander astray. Yet this conference gave me the space to slow down, to worship, and to remember that Jesus is still Lord of heaven and earth, and he gives us everything we need to live "in but not of the world" as his disciples.

I hope you have a wonderful month of May, and I look forward to seeing

you Sunday!

#### **DOLLARS & CENTS**

When I was growing up, the giving of tithes and offerings was handled differently. At the beginning of the year, each family was given a box of 52 envelopes each with their personal envelope number and dated for each Sunday that year. You put cash or a check in and put it in the offering plate. If you missed a Sunday, you had two envelopes to put in when you returned. The advent of donating to charities on-line has changed things for a lot of us. It makes it easy for the donor to set up a donation to be taken from their bank account or charged to their credit card regularly, once a week or once a month or even once a year and you don't have to worry about forgetting to bring your check book. This works well for the treasurer and the tellers because there is less cash and checks to record on any given Sunday and a more accurate record of giving. Another way people choose to give is arrange with their bank to mail a check once or twice a month to our PO box. These checks are put in the teller box to be included in that week's count.



Just out of curiosity, I ran a report on last year and found that 32% of our total income was given online, 3% was given in cash and 63% was given in checks. There were 28 unique donors using the online option. It looks like these percentages are holding true for 2024.

I know for some, the act of putting their gift in the offering plate is part of their worship. For me, knowing my gift will be posted to the bank account at the first of the month is my way of giving the first fruits of our income to Him. Whichever way you choose to give is worship to Him and a blessing for our work at FPC Sylva.

Mayapples are one of our most recognizable spring ephemeral wild-flowers. These plants are easy to spot in the woods, growing as colonies of rich, green fairy umbrellas. You can find them growing with either a single leaf or with two; however, only plants with two
