

PASTOR'S NOTES

Dear church family,

During worship on Sunday mornings, I have been starting my sermons with a quotation from Paul in Philippians 3: "I want to know Christ…" This has been a grounding and centering word for me during the season of Lent, and I hope it has for



you, too. This is why we're Christians. This is why we're here, as a church. We don't just want to know <u>about</u> Christ. We want to <u>know</u> Christ.

But knowing Christ is not a one-and-done kind of thing. It is a process, a journey, an ongoing road we must walk. As Paul says, "Not that I have already obtained all this... but I press on to take hold of that for which Christ Jesus took hold of me. Brothers and sisters, I do not consider myself yet to have taken hold of it. But one thing I do: Forgetting what is behind and straining toward what is ahead, I press on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in Christ Jesus."


Do you hear the main verb in that section? It's the Greek word διώκω, meaning to desire, to pursue, or (as the NIV Bible says) to press on. Paul is pressing on to know Jesus, which involves leaning away from the past and leaning towards the future. He's striving, seeking, searching. He's devoting himself and his entire life to the one, singular goal of gaining or taking hold of Christ. And ultimately, he rests in the good news that Christ has already gained or taken hold of him. In other words, all of Paul's work is dependent upon God's grace.

What do you *press on* towards? What guides you, directs you, and orients you in these final weeks of winter? In this wounded and weary world? In this one, beautiful life you get to live? It has to be something. What would you say we as a church family press on towards in our life together?

As the season of Lent continues and we make our way to the cross and empty tomb, let's continue to press on towards Jesus, that we might know him and be known by him, too.



DOLLARS & CENTS

In the recent issue of The Sylva Herald, I read that Bruce Reynolds had died. For over 13 years, I have sent Mr. Reynolds a check for \$833.33 at the first of the month as a mortgage payment for what we now know as the Transition House. It occurred to me that with the number of new members in our church, many of you would not know the history of how that purchase came to be. Christine Reynolds lived at 10 Presbyterian Drive for many years and was a neighbor to the manse which was converted to the MIP center in the 1990s. Bruce Reynolds inherited the house upon her death and wanted the church to have first refusal on its sale. There was a lot of discussion by the Session about buying it. We didn't have immediate need of the space or the land. But we stepped out in faith and it eventual-



ly became the Transition House, a wonderful mission to the graduates of Life Challenge who can live there for a low rent and a portion of utilities for the first year after graduation. Mr. Reynold's gave us the opportunity to buy the house and God gave us the opportunity to provide a safe place for the women to grow and thrive. I am grateful to them both. We have 20 more payments to go before it is paid off.

Items can include: Small appliances such as stereo equipment, radios, clean toaster ovens and other items in good operable condition; Kitchen accessories such as dishes, cookware and accessories; DVD's and books; Small furnishings such as end tables, lamps, side tables and chairs; and, Gardening accessories such as flower pots, spades, decorative stoneware, etc. We will have a table in the Fellowship Hall for you to leave your donations. PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN

Our study this month centered on the miraculous encounter in Acts 3, in which the apostles Peter and John healed a man with a physical disability. In ancient times, people with disabilities had no rights or protections. Their impairments were believed to be punishments for their or their parents' sins. They survived by begging. Jesus,

and then his apostles, not only brought salvation and miraculously healed people with physical disabilities, but they affirmed that they were children of God who should be treated with dignity and equity. This was a total overturning of the social rule of marginalizing and discriminating. It is the approach we seek to emulate today, following the radical example of Jesus. To help bring this to life, Marjorie Eyre, our teacher for the lesson, brought her dear friend, Glenda Snow, to join us. Glenda is blind. She has a powerful testimony of how God has used her blindness for His glory. She shared a host of amazing adaptive devices she uses to keep her independent. She reminded us that though she has achieved remarkable independence, she needs others, and appreciates her own church family who are quick to give her rides and provide support whenever she needs it.

Saint Patrick, who lived during the fifth century, is the patron saint of Ireland and its national apostle. Born in Roman Britain, he was kidnapped and brought to Ireland as a slave at 16. He later escaped, but returned to Ireland and was cred-

ited with bringing Christianity to its people.

In the centuries following Patrick's death (believed to have been on March 17, 461), the mythology surrounding his life became ever more ingrained in the Irish culture: Perhaps the most well-known legend of St. Patrick is that he explained the Holy Trinity using the three leaves of a native Irish clover, the shamrock.

The first St. Patrick's Day parade took place not in Ireland but in America. Records show that a St. Patrick's Day parade was held on March 17, 1601 in a Spanish colony in what is now **St. Augustine, Florida.** The parade, and a St. Patrick's Day celebration a year earlier were organized by the Spanish Colony's Irish vicar Ricardo Artur.




