FROM THE **PASTOR'S DESK**

Dear church family,



SESSION UPDATE

Although there were not many formal motions approved at the April meeting of the session, it was a lively gathering. James McManus led the devotion based on the book we are reading, *Emotionally Healthy Spirituality*. The chapter we read focused on how our family legacies may negatively influence our spiritual health. Unhealthy interactions with family early in our lives can distort our understanding of the Gospel and our ongoing relationships with God, our families, and our neighbors. Clearer awareness of those influences can help us take issues before the Lord thoughtfully and prayerfully.

Alisha Thomas and the Finance Committee brought concerns about the stability of our general fund. I have always been amazed at how our congregation steps up in time of need, strongly supporting building funds (mortgages always paid off early) and missions. The general fund pays our staff and the light bill. It is best supported by giving that can be counted on month to month, year to year. The Finance Committee presented a letter you may have already received detailing these concerns. The Session discussed the letter at length and approved its distribution. While we are confident our faith-based system will continue to work, we see churches closed at many Presbytery meetings, and it is important for us to continue to monitor our church's financial health.

Roger Murajda and Kelder Monar gave a report from the Landscaping Task Force. The church grounds are being transformed. Volunteers will do flower planting at the workday on the first Saturday in May. Those of you who have a green thumb should help out while those of us who do not do less skilled work.

God's Creatures and Creation, continued:

Saturday, April 22nd was Earth Day but every single day is the Lord 's Day. Continuing from last month's article about pollution, this month we are featuring God's animals and human impact upon them.

What's Happening to the Lord's Animals?

Monitored populations of vertebrates (mammals, birds, amphibians, reptiles and fish) have seen a devastating 69% drop on average since 1970, according to World Wildlife Fund's (WWF) <u>Living Planet Report 2022</u>. Populations in Latin America and the Caribbean have fared worst, with an average decline of 94%. Global freshwater species have also been disproportionately impacted, declining 83% on average).

The report identifies several key drivers of biodiversity decline including habitat loss, species overexploitation, invasive species, pollution, climate change and diseases. It also calls on policymakers to transform economies so that natural resources are properly valued. As biodiversity loss and climate change share many of the same underlying causes, actions that transform food production and consumption, rapidly cut emissions, and invest in conservation can mitigate the twin crises.

"The world is waking up to the fact that our future depends on reversing the loss of nature just as much as it depends on addressing climate change. And you can't solve one without solving the other," says Carter Roberts, president and CEO of WWF-US. "Everyone has a role to play in reversing these trends, from individuals to companies to governments."


"These plunges in wildlife populations can have dire consequences for our health and economies," says Rebecca Shaw, global chief scientist of WWF. "When wildlife populations decline to this degree, it means dramatic changes are impacting their habitats and the food and water they rely on. We should care deeply about the unraveling of natural systems because these same resources sustain human life."

The biggest declines globally were seen in freshwater species, with populations down by an average of 83 per cent. The report says habitat loss and barriers to migration routes are to blame for about half of the decline in migratory fish species. [What we see here in Jackson County is the tremendous amount of trash and discarded materials that are entering

our creeks, streams and the Tuckasegee River, impacting our own drinking water as well as the habitat for salamanders, trout, herons and many other species in and around our waterways.]



While North America and Western Europe did not see such dramatic declines as other parts of the world, its biodiversity strength was eroded by the development of farmland long before the 1970s — and although Europe and Central Asia had the smallest decline of the regions, prior to 1970, "many species were already in a depleted state," according to the report.

In the past 50 years nearly <u>three billion birds</u> have disappeared across North America and the European Union alone, a 2022 report noted. And experts are worried that it could be a bigger sign about the health of our ecosystems.

"In the 2018 report only 40 per cent of the bird species were found to be in decline while the 2022 report found 49 percent in decline. So in four years, we've had this huge jump in the

number of birds that are at risk," said Sam Knight, a program manager at the Nature Conservancy of Canada.

"And they've shown that one in eight are actually threatened with extinction. So it's really concerning that in such a small time period this is what's happened, and the pressures these birds are facing, and biodiversity overall."

What Can Those of Us at FPC Do?

As the studies noted above, habitat loss is one of the leading causes of species decline today. All habitats, regardless of size, are essential to the survival of native wildlife. We can all take small steps in our daily lives to make a positive impact on our local environment. By providing natural foods, water, cover and places to raise young, you can help to restore and enhance wildlife habitat in your own backyard and community. With thoughtful planting and natural growth preservation, songbirds, butterflies, dragonflies and game species such as deer, quail and turkey can make their home on your property, or find refuge there during migration.

You can also pick up trash, conserve home energy, consolidate errands to drive less- decreasing automobile emissions, re-use and recycle packaging and products, and, be mindful of and reduce waste. It is particularly important to reduce food waste as much as possible since we tend to waste hundreds of pounds of food per family each year that costs our environment not only in the trash it produces but also in the harm to our environment through the cultivation and harvesting of the extensive food supplies in the first place. The efforts you make in your home and that of our community can truly make a difference to all of God's creation!
